God Doesn't Whisper Chapter 1: Crisis at College, Pt. 2

For the next number of months, the newsletter column will feature excerpts from chapters of Pastor Jim's forthcoming book titled God Doesn't Whisper, available sometime in fall of 2019. This new book critiques the widely popular belief in modern evangelicalism that God gives personal and private revelation outside of Scripture. It is a popular belief that God whispers new and fresh words to us through promptings, nudgings, a "still, small voice," and various other means.

This month features the second half of chapter 1 titled "A Crisis at College."

Scripture appeared to be jam-packed with examples of believers who heard God speak: Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Joshua, David, Solomon, Daniel, Peter, Paul, Cornelius, and countless others. Couldn't God just break His silence long enough to do for me what He had done for so many others?

I comforted myself with the thought that maybe I didn't have enough knowledge of the Bible to qualify as one who got to hear the voice of God. Maybe I needed to be more mature and spiritual before John 10:27 would apply to me. After all, I wasn't nearly as well-taught and mature in the faith as many of my

classmates. When I showed up at Bible college, I knew nothing, and I mean NOTHING. I was light-years behind all my classmates. Many of them were raised in the church and some of them were children of staff at the school. Perhaps my problem was a lack of knowledge.

So, I decided to give God His "out."

"Lord, if it is Your will for me to return next year, then I need a sign. If You want me back then cause my whole second year's tuition to be paid in full. Then I will know Your will. That will be a clear sign that would convince friends and family back home that You are supernaturally directing this decision. Please do for me what you did for Gideon—just give me a sign. Amen."

Nothing.

Maybe my request had been too ambitious. I should probably dial it back a bit to something more reasonable.

"Ok, Lord, just half a year's tuition. Cause someone

to just pay for the first semester. And I will take that as a sign that you want me to return."

Nothing.

"Lord, if someone steps forward and sends in money that will cover my books for second year, then I know that it is Your will. Never mind tuition, all I ask for is enough money for my books." Suddenly I felt less like Gideon with a fleece and more like Abraham negotiating with God to spare a city.

Still nothing.

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I was distraught. I wanted to come back for second year, but God wasn't giving me a sign to confirm it. I wasn't hearing Him tell me what He wanted me to do! Why was God being so silent? Didn't He love me? Wasn't He interested in my future? Didn't He know what was at stake? Couldn't the God who spoke the universe into existence and created all things simply give me a little word, a whisper, a nudge, ... SOMETHING? I would even take sign language over silence!

Why wasn't I hearing from God? I needed direction - specific guidance - like I had never needed it before. Why was I unable to hear when all my friends seemed to be getting their personal messages just fine? Maybe something was wrong with me!

The Insignificance of It

The crisis in college was monumental to me as a young believer. What I needed from God seemed so simple and small. I just needed a sign, some pointer, some indication, no matter how small.

I wasn't asking God for direction concerning a decision with a large number of possible options. I had it narrowed down to two. That seemed easy enough. I wasn't asking for a burning bush or a pillar of cloud and fire to guide me. In fact, I wasn't asking for any kind of "miraculous" sign at all. It was a small ask.

I was praying, looking, and listening as best I knew how. I kept my eyes open and tried to discern in everything any kind of hint or suggestion that might be from Him. How hard could it possibly be for the God of all the universe to just drop me a few breadcrumbs to show the way? Even if I was ignorant, unknowledgeable, and immature in my faith, why should that have kept God from being able to communicate clearly with me? Why would my lack of perception create such an insurmountable obstacle to hearing God's voice? Is God unable to speak loudly and clearly? Can't He get His message across, even to one who isn't adept at picking up the signals?

I couldn't believe that God was unable to clearly communicate when He needed to do so. It didn't seem that the issue was with God's ability. It didn't seem that the problem was with me either. I was certainly "hungry enough" to hear from God. I couldn't have desired to hear from Him more. I was desperately longing for clear guidance. I micro-analyzed every thought, feeling, intuition, nudging, and prompting that popped into my anxious brain. I examined every event, circumstance, and happening around me, trying to wring out of them some meaning which might be a clear marker of the divine will.

Eventually I started to wonder, "If God doesn't lack the power to speak, and I do not lack the passion to hear, then maybe the problem is with my understanding of how God communicates to His people." I started to entertain the idea that I was wrong about the way God speaks. Was I expecting God to do something He had not promised? Did I really need a sign or a revelation of some kind to know and do the will of God? Did I need information not revealed in Scripture?

The Question Nobody Asked

The prevailing wisdom among the student body was that God gives guidance and personal revelation for decision-making. We must listen for Him and learn to cultivate the discipline of hearing His voice. I had just assumed that all the talk I heard about God leading His people through the "still, small voice," nudgings, promptings, and impressions was biblical. I accepted it without any misgivings. I heard mature Christians speak as if God were whispering certain directions in their ears. I assumed I was missing out on this kind of intimate conversation due to my own lack of piety or maturity.

I figured it would only be a matter of time before I could achieve that level of spirituality. Soon I, too, would learn the essential discipline of divining the signs and hearing the voice of God. Eventually, I would be able to move forward with my decisions and my day -to-day activities with the confidence that I was being guided by God's voice. Someday, I believed, I could have that real and personal relationship where God conversed with me through signs and whispers.

The crisis of my first year in college began to unravel this way of thinking. Was this really what the Bible taught? I had always assumed it was, simply because so many Christians I knew believed and practiced it

It wasn't until my fourth year at Millar that the pieces finally came together. A beloved college professor confronted our class with what should have been the most obvious question of all: "Does the Bible teach that God directs His people in this way?" This should be the only question we are interested in answering, but it seems to be the last one entertained in the mind of the one who thinks they are receiving divine revelation.

The Non-Charismatic View

As you might guess, this view of hearing God's voice was not just the prevailing thinking among the student body of which I was a part. It is the predominant view of modern evangelicalism. I have encountered countless believers who make decisions based on a subjective impression, a sign, or a still, small voice in their head. I would venture to guess that among non-charismatic Christians, probably more than 80% believe that God continues to give personal revelation to His people. I would not be *Continued on page 7*

Publications



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surprised to discover that to be a wildly conservative estimate.

A simple Google search for "Hearing the Voice of God" will churn up a subjective slough of teaching on how to receive personal revelations from God. Amazon offers a prolific selection of titles specifically designed to prepare you to hear from God and teach you to discern His voice. These teachings and titles originate from all across the fruited theological plains. "Private revelation" is no longer the ugly theological stepchild of the charismatic movement. It has been adopted by the broad swath of evangelicalism, finding a warm welcome in traditionally non-charismatic churches.

You might expect charismatic and Pentecostal Christians to affirm continuing personal revelation from God. Those who believe God continues to give prophetic revelation through modern prophets and apostles will most certainly affirm that every believer hears God's voice for themselves.

Those in the Word of Faith and New Apostolic Reformation (NAR) movements not only teach that God gives private personal revelations to individuals, but that He also gifts both prophets and prophetesses within the church today. They promote the prophetic office and believe God is speaking in the church with the same authority, clarity, and accuracy He once spoke in Scripture.

The NAR movement teaches that "apostles" are again active in the church. They believe God is raising up a new generation of apostles, equal in authority and miracle-working power as the New Testament apostles, to bring His dominion to bear on this earth. Not to be outdone by those in the Word Faith Movement, the extreme claims of NAR teachers regarding miracles and supernatural phenomena are patently absurd and demonstrably false. ¹

We would expect charismatics to teach this model of divine guidance, but why do we find this even among non-charismatics?

Your local Christian bookstore is likely to be well-stocked with books on how to hear the voice of God written by non-charismatic pastors of non-charismatic churches who were educated in non-charismatic colleges and seminaries.

For instance, nobody would accuse Charles Stanley of being a charismatic who believes in the continuation of revelatory gifts, yet Stanley wrote *How to Listen to God*. He has produced volumes of articles, videos, books, and sermons on this subject. Zondervan published *The Power of a Whisper* by Bill Hybels, another non-charismatic pastor. Priscilla Shirer, the daughter of popular preacher Tony Evans, has produced numerous books on hearing the voice of God. Shirer has written *He Speaks to Me* and *Discerning the Voice of God*, and her website promotes a plethora of resources designed to instruct Christians on how to hear the voice of God

through various means. Priscilla Shirer is a graduate of the non-charismatic Dallas Theological Seminary.

We might expect the Southern Baptist Convention and their affiliated churches and ministries to hold the line on the continuation of revelation. Yet Henry Blackaby's book *Experiencing God* has found wide circulation in Baptist circles. Blackaby has single-handedly done more to promote the practice of listening for the voice of God than any other non-charismatic in modern evangelicalism. That accomplishment is due in no small part to the blitzkrieg-like promotion of his books by the Southern Baptist Convention, Lifeway Christian Resources, and a myriad of Baptist pastors across the country.

The infiltration of this theology into non-charismatic circles has been swift and thorough.

Is it biblical?

In the following chapters, I intend to answer that question. I will interact with the teachings of those who promote the "hearing from God" practice and theology. Scripture shall be our guide as we ask the question, "Does the Bible teach that Christians should expect regular personal revelation outside of Scripture?"

What about the crisis at college? Did I ever hear the voice of the Shepherd? No. In the end, I did that which I most desired to do. I wanted to return to college and resume my study of Scripture and theology. If you haven't guessed by now, I never pursued a career in accounting. I never attended a secular university. I returned to Millar for a second and third year, still without any designs or intention of pursuing or entering full time Christian ministry. Following graduation from the third year, I married my beautiful bride. I took one year off from school and then returned for the newly-minted fourth-year internship program.

I made all those decisions, and thousands of others that have brought me to this point, without nurturing an ability to hear still, small voices. I walk with Christ day by day and enjoy sweet fellowship with Him in His Word. I don't listen for whispers. I have come to understand that *God Doesn't Whisper*.

For an excellent critique of these charismatic movements and doctrines, check out the ministry of Justin Peters at his website justinpeters.org. The video series of Justin's seminar *Clouds Without Water* is highly recommended. I would also recommend *Defining Deception* by Costi Hinn and Anthony Wood (Southern California Seminary Press, 2018).
